



# Nunhead Cemetery, Southwark

**Simple Rules of Thumb** (assuming nobody has married a relative)

- 'Grand,' 'Great' and 'Removed' all have much the same meaning: for each occurrence the basic relationship applies to one additional generation up the ancestor tree. For example, your 2<sup>nd</sup> cousin once removed is your parent's 2<sup>nd</sup> cousin; your great-great uncle is your grandparent's uncle.
- Move n+1 generations up the ancestor tree to find the nearest common ancestor of you and your n<sup>th</sup> cousin. For example, you and your second cousin have common great grandparents but not common grandparents.  
Another way of saying this is that the nearest common ancestor of you and your n<sup>th</sup> cousin is your great<sup>n-1</sup> grandparent.
