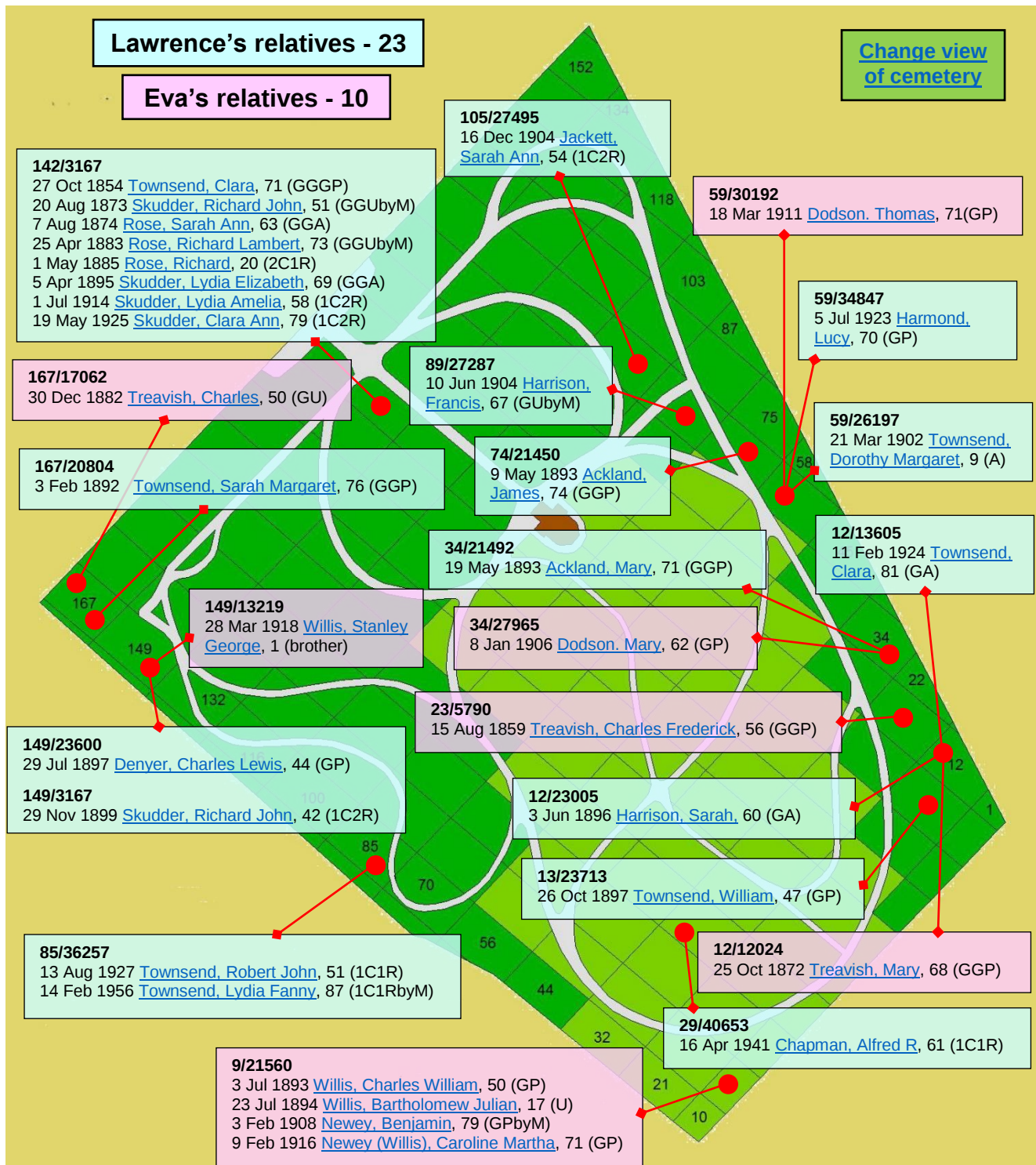


Nunhead Cemetery, Southwark

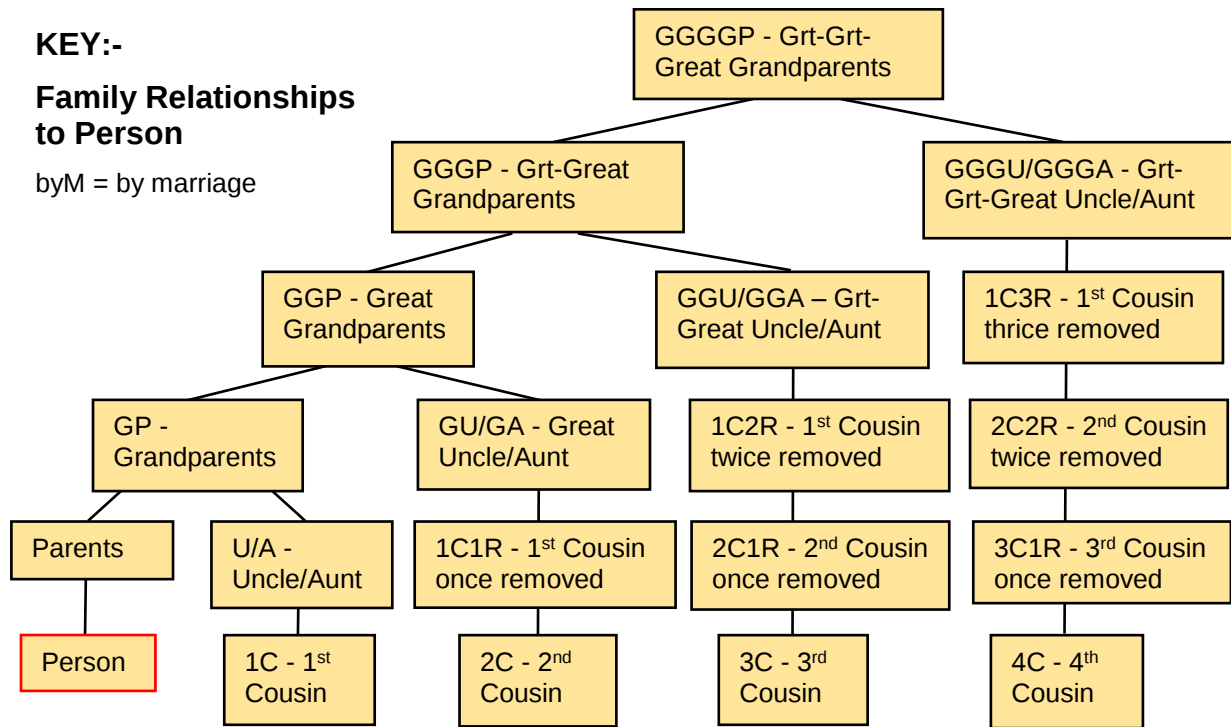
Burial sites of 33 deceased relatives of Lawrence and Eva Townsend

Simple Rules of Thumb (assuming nobody has married a relative)

- 'Grand,' 'Great' and 'Removed' all have much the same meaning: for each occurrence the basic relationship applies to one additional generation up the ancestor tree. For example, your 2nd cousin once removed is your parent's 2nd cousin; your great-great uncle is your grandparent's uncle.
- Move n+1 generations up the ancestor tree to find the nearest common ancestor of you and your nth cousin. For example, you and your second cousin have common great grandparents but not common grandparents.
Another way of saying this is that the nearest common ancestor of you and your nth cousin is your greatⁿ⁻¹ grandparent.
